See this possible list of book for the TV series *Boardwalk Empire* and compare with your own findings:

Last Call: The Rise and Fall of Prohibition by Daniel Okrent. Historical context – The Prohibition Era.

Battling Demon Rum: The Struggle for a Dry America, 1800-1933 by Thomas R. Pegram. Historical context – the political system in the United States, for the storylines about political figures.

Flapper: A Madcap Story of Sex, Style, Celebrity, and the Women Who Made America Modern by Joshua Zeitz. The sexual politics of the 1920s, relevant for the female characters of the series.

Rothstein: The Life, Times, and Murder of the Criminal Genius Who Fixed the 1919 World Series by David Pietrusza. A biography of one of the most interesting supporting characters of Boardwalk Empire.

Places of Their Own: African American Suburbanization in the Twentieth Century by Andrew Wiese. One of the main characters is African American, so a deep knowledge of African American History is mandatory for a screenwriter.

Enemies: A History of the FBI by Tim Weiner. A lengthy account of the history of the FBI, for the storylines about law enforcement.
